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Hall's summer project puts students at the forefront of Al research




Dr. Kimberly Hall is the college's leading voice on Al.

Five students have joined forces with Dr. Kimberly Hall this summer to discover how artificial intelligence can more effectively be incorporated in a college setting.

Hall, an associate professor of English who leads the college's Al Working Group, says current research focuses on how faculty and administrators view generative Al — a platform like ChatGPT for instance. She is making sure student perspectives are included.
