



### PROFILE OF THE WEEK: Vermont Law School – Environmental Law Center

The Environmental Law Center (ELC) at Vermont Law School boosts that it offers more environmental and energy law courses than any other U.S. law school. It is ranked #1 in environmental law by the 2017 edition of *U.S. News* & *World Report's Best Grad Schools*.

ELC offers several masters degrees including a Master of Environmental Law and Policy (MELP), Master of Energy Regulation and Law (MERL), Master of Food and Agriculture Law and Policy (MFALP). Each of these can be pursued jointly with a JD degree. Post-JD students have the opportunity to pursue a Masters of Law (LLM) in Energy Law, Environmental Law, American Legal Studies, or Food and Agriculture Law. Dual degrees are also offered through institutions such as Yale, Cambridge, and the University of Vermont.
