Study Abroad in Australia by Natalie Lassiter

Last semester I spent four months in Australia, mostly in the state of New South Wales. My study abroad program's focus was on Sustainability and Environmental Action. There were nineteen other students from all over the United States, coming from various universities, backgrounds, and majors. All twenty of us were completely different people, yet were tied together by our passion for protecting and taking care of the earth.

Some highlights of my time abroad were when we visited Tasmania, one of the most gorgeous places I have ever explored.
