List of Professional Editors

Wofford College Writing Center

The Wofford Writing Center has compiled the following list of professional editors as a resource for faculty – these editors are not appropriate resources for undergraduate students (Wofford students – y'all can visit us in the WC!). This is a list of people with editing experience who have expressed interest in working with Wofford's scholarly community, but they are not affiliated with Wofford or the Writing Center. All the editors below will expect to be compensated fairly for their time, but any arrangement you make is between yourself and them.

If you are new to the process of working with an academic editor, you may want to start by consulting this article by Wendy Laura Belcher explaining the process, which will help you to understand what you can expect.

If you are wondering how much hiring an editor might cost, here are some standard industry rates – however, every project is unique, and every editor sets their own rates as a freelance worker, so the rates below should only be considered as rough estimates – this information is borrowed from UT Austin.

Editing

- o Basic copyediting: 5-10 ms pgs/hr, \$30-40/hr
- o Heavy copyediting: 2–5 ms pgs/hr, \$40–50/hr
- o Developmental editing: 1–5 pgs/hr, \$45–55/hr
- o Substantive or line editing: 1–6 ms pgs/hr, \$40–60/hr

Other services

- o Proofreading: 9-13 ms pgs/hr, \$30-35/hr
- o Translating: 300-500 wds/hr, \$40-50/hr

• Wendy Belcher's Suggestions

- o "The average rate at which copyeditors edit is 4 pages (or 1,000 words) per hour."
- o "First, review the manuscript... If your footnotes have never been spell-checked, spell-check them. If your references are not standardized, fix them.... Once you have fixed what you can, identify exactly how many pages are in your manuscript (don't guess, divide the total electronic word count by 250 words). Divide this figure by 4 (pages an hour) to arrive at the likely total cost of copyediting."
- o 200-page dissertation = 50 hours x \$30 = \$1500.
